OPENING NOTE FROM THE FOUNDERS

Thirty years ago we both set out, initially independently, to develop networks and activities to develop the broad field of operations and technology management. Important objectives were among others to make the field of OM more established and accepted as a management discipline, to raise the level of quality in research and to strengthen the European community of researchers in the field. We soon got together, and with the help and support of many others, this led to the formation of EurOMA.

From small beginnings, all of our initial ambitions have been met and surpassed. From a small network of likeminded individuals, EurOMA has developed into a Europe-based, global community with its vibrant conference and its own journal. In the context of other similar associations in Europe and the US, EurOMA has developed a particular distinctive style and positioning. This is through, but not exclusive, focus on both empirical research and research that engages closely with industry, both manufacturing and service. This has led to and is being supported by the book "Researching Operations Management", which was developed based on the work done by us and other EurOMA members in developing the research methodology course at EIASM.

Since we have stepped back and let the association be taken forward by others, there are many things that give us pleasure. First, has been the growth of the portfolio of activities to support the discipline,

and in particular to help develop the younger and newer members of the community. Second has been the degree to which members have enthusiastically taken on board both the management of the association and its conferences, it is so much better organised than when we were more closely involved, and in particular the development and management of all the new initiatives from the publishing and doctoral workshops and areas such as service. All of these have teams putting in time, commitment and enthusiasm to make them successful. A third area is the broadening of the community, for example, in the past decade the involvement of those in the supply chain and logistics area has grown enormously. The building of global links through the world conferences and strong links with POMS has been important.

The conference is a source of both pride and pleasure. Pride through the professionalism, the process ensuring that there are strong contributions, and the insistence on papers, not just abstracts as in many equivalent conferences. Pleasure because of the commitment to making each conference special from the conference dinner to meeting up with everyone.

As co-founders we would like to thank all those who have played a part in moving the small organisation that we founded 20 years ago to become the success that it is today. We would also welcome all the newer members of EurOMA and encourage you to become part of our community and to play your role in taking EurOMA forward for the next 20 years. EurOMA's success has been based on its ability to serve the members and to evolve over time. We encourage you to keep the process going and to participate enthusiastically in our community.

THE FORMATION OF EUROMA

was officially created at the beginning of 1994 as a result of joining different European initiatives, from which OMA UK can be considered the embryo of our actual association.

The first idea for forming an association in the operations management field came out of a workshop in Production/Operations Management held at London Business School in January 1983 organised by Chris Voss. At the workshop Bob Johnston, Barbara Morris, Nigel Slack and Colin Armistead identified a need to bring those in the area together on a continuing basis. They invited the workshop organizer, Chris Voss, for a drink at the local pub, appropriately named The Volunteer, and asked him, which he agreed, to volunteer to develop this group. In March 1983 he sent a newsletter to 150 teachers and researchers in the UK with an invitation to join the initiative and after receiving an excellent response the organisation was formalised in September 1983. The next steps of the association were further formalisation and the start of the regular conferences. Increasingly, over the years the conference became more international, having in 1993 28 papers from non-UK authors out of conference 69 papers.

In parallel to the UK OMA, the European Institute for Advanced Studies in Management (EIASM), established in 1972 to promote management research in Europe, decided to add “technology related issues” to its portfolio of management topics in 1984. Christer Karlsson was made Professor of Production and Product Development Management. During the early years, this area of EIASM focused on organizing workshops, seminars and doctoral tutorials held in Brussels. The next step was to organize a biannual

international conference on Production Management. The first conference was held in 1987 at Twente University (The Netherlands) and 33 full papers were accepted for presentation. They came from 8 European countries as well as from Canada and USA: Members of the scientific committee came also from different countries: During, Krabbendam and Bakker (The Netherlands), Ferdows (France), Bullinger (Germany), Karlsson (Sweden) and Voss (UK). It was an international conference from the start.

The 4th International Production Management conference organized by EIASM was held at London Business School. During the collaboration of Chris Voss and Christer Karlsson in organising this conference it became clear that the two initiatives (the UK OMA and the International Production Management conferences) should merge and combine their strengths. Hence, it was proposed that OMA UK could be the base for a European Association and the International Production Management Conference could be the base for its annual conference. UK OMA held a referendum to ask members if the organisation should migrate to the proposed European Operations Management Association (EurOMA). The result was a 98% yes vote.

Harry Boer, Christer Karlsson and Chris Voss, together with Gerry van Dyck from EIASM met several times to work out the details of the formation of the new association, which was officially formed at the beginning of 1994. The first EurOMA conference was held in Cambridge in 1994 with more than 130 papers published in the proceedings.

Apart from the annual conference over the last years there have been a number of major initiatives arising from EurOMA. The most important ones have been associated with the development of young researchers and emerging faculty in Operations Management. In the following sections there is a review of our past activities.

OVERVIEW OF PAST EUROMA CONFERENCES

PRECURSOR CONFERENCES

The first EurOMA conference was held in Cambridge in 1994, with the intention to merge UK OMA and International Production Management (IPM) Conferences. The first UK OMA conference, if we consider the workshop in production/OM organized by Chris Voss at the London Business School, was held in 1983. 50 UK participants attended the workshop and 36 papers were presented. The proceedings of the 1983 conference were published in Voss, C.A. (Ed.), *Research in Production/Operations Management*, Gower. The following table summarizes the main information on the UK OMA conferences organized over the years.

OTHER EUROMA EVENTS

Over the last 20 years EurOMA has organized different initiatives. Most of them are related with the development of young researchers and faculty in Operations Management (e.g. The Young Scholars Workshop, the Doctoral Seminar, etc.). Others aim at developing a community of scholars in a specific Operations Management area (e.g. The Service Forum and The Sustainability Forum). Next, we briefly describe these initiatives.

EurOMA Doctoral Seminar

The Doctoral Seminar (DS) was launched in 2002 by Jan Mouritsen and Harry Boer. Since then various professors have been in charge of its organization (Harry Boer until 2008 and Pär Åhlström from 2009 to today). The event is usually held during the two days immediately prior to the main conference.

The Seminar provides PhD candidates with a forum to present and discuss their research, and get feedback. It is also a good opportunity to exchange comments with fellow PhD students and established researchers in the Operations Management field.

At the Seminar, PhD candidates are divided into small groups, which are supervised each by two experienced faculty mentors. Each candidate presents their research and then receives feedback from two other candidates and the faculty. Students who present their early work are invited back to present their near complete work at the DS the following year.

EurOMA Young Scholars Workshop

The first Young Scholars Workshop (YSW) was held immediately prior to the EurOMA 2009 conference in Gothenburg, and was coordinated by Harry Boer in close collaboration with the EurOMA Board, in particular Raffaella Cagliano. Since then, the Workshop has been run annually the day prior to the annual conference.

The YSW is targeted at young OM academics and it is conceived as a way to support their career development. At the same time, the initiative is aimed at developing the community of young OM scholars keeping the network alive.

At the Workshop, experienced faculty teach and share with younger academics the major skills needed in academic careers, such as supervising Masters and PhD students, reviewing papers, writing papers, networking, teaching, etc.

EurOMA Publishing Workshop

In October 2008 the first Publishing Workshop was held in Nice (France). The Workshop was organised by Marie Koulikoff-Souviron, assisted by Juliana Hsuan. Since then, the event has been held annually (during the autumn) in various locations (Nice, Vicenza and Barcelona).

The purpose of the Publishing Workshop is to provide guidance by experienced scholars and editors on how to publish in leading journals in our field. Drawing directly on the editorial experiences of Chris Voss, Cipriano Forza, Andrew Taylor, Margaret Taylor, Steve Brown, Steve Childe and Roger Maull, among others, the workshop has become an annual event.

This year, for the first time, the Publishing Workshop will run two modules. Module 1, which is part of the EurOMA 2013 Annual Conference, aims to provide broad guidelines to develop the conference paper into a journal paper. Module 2 will be run in the autumn (as usual) and it aims to provide an in-depth review of the full paper and help authors to develop this paper into a journal-level submission. EurOMA Summer School

Since 2009, EurOMA jointly with local organizers stages a Summer School. The initiative was originally led by Raffaella Cagliano and held in Brixen in 2009 followed by Como in 2010 (both in Italy). Subsequent summer schools (2011 and 2012) have been organized by Kristina Demeter in Budapest, Hungary. The 2013 Summer School will be held in Cranfield, UK. The main objectives of the Summer School are:

1. To help PhD students in defining relevant research topics.
2. To foster the development of a network of young researchers in the field of OM – which could become a forum for exchanging ideas and building research collaborations.

EurOMA Service Forum

Identified as one key area within Operations Management, Andi Smart organized the 1st International EurOMA Service Operations Management (SOM) Forum workshop in Exeter in 2008. This initiative was followed by subsequent annual workshops: Barcelona (organised by Jaume Ribera in 2009), Bath (organised by Mike Lewis, Niall Piercy and Nigel Caldwell in 2010), Florence (led by Mario Rapaccini and Sergio Cavalieri in 2011) and Cambridge (organised by Andy Neely and Duncan MacFarlane in 2012). The next forum will be held as part of a joint event in Las Vegas (USA) in August 2013. For more information, visit <http://www.euroma-online.org>.

The aim of the Forum is to develop a community of scholars to address the main research challenges on services. During the forum typical discussions cover the following topics: perspectives on the future of services, current trends of tertiarization, modeling of complex service systems, etc.

EurOMA Sustainability Forum

Sustainability is a fast developing field and like other relatively new topics there are numerous questions for both business and research. With the aim to provide support in our search for how Operations Management can contribute to sustainability, a Sustainability Forum has recently been designed. The inaugural event will be organized by Dirk Pieter van Donk, Taco van der Vaart, Cristina Giménez, Miriam Wilhelm and Annachiara Longoni, and will be held in Groningen (Netherlands) in March 2014.

The Sustainability Forum aims to be a meeting place for all researchers interested in the Sustainable Operations and Supply Chains area who would like to contribute their recent work and open it for discussion with other colleagues in the field, explore new research ideas, teaching, and the needs of business. The event fosters in-depth discussions of the field in a small setting, with potential for generation of new insights, collaboration opportunities and future research topics.

Although the Sustainability Forum's target audience is mainly academic, the involvement of practitioner participants is highly desirable and will actively be promoted.

The Sustainability Forum will be a yearly event with possible follow-ups in Barcelona, Lancaster and/or Milan.
